Join the Downtown Alliance

Several years ago a small group of volunteers gathered to plan and execute a clean-up of Main Street. They continued to meet and work on downtown improvements, including the creation of the Museum on the Streets historical markers, the development of Liberty Park and the introduction of Music in Ritter Plaza.

Previously referred to as "The Downtown Group," these volunteers have formally adopted the name "Downtown Alliance." They invite all residents and businesses interested in continuing the improvement of the downtown district to join.

The Downtown Alliance meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month, at 4:00, in the Town Hall Conference Room. Because the fourth Tuesday in December is Christmas Day, the next meeting will be on January 22. Mark your calendars now!

Utility Rates to Increase

The New Castle Town Council will adopt the budget for 2019 in December, covering both the General Fund and the Utility Fund. The General Fund is used for most Town expenses, such as the Police Department, street maintenance, parks, recreation, etc. It is funded by taxes and fees.

The Utility Fund is an enterprise, meaning that it functions as a business, operating the water and sewer systems and garbage collection. Like other businesses, it depends on payment for services, which are charged in the monthly utility bills.

The 2019 budget includes adjustments in the water, sewer and trash service base rates. The increases will assure that the utility fund can cover basic oper-

ations, future repairs and capital improvements.

The base rates for utility services will increase as follows:

Water service base rate increase: \$4.37 Sewer service base rate increase: \$7.89 Trash service base rate increase: \$ 3.35

There will still be a senior discount and a surcharge for out-of-town water clients. Full details of the increase will be in the January utility bill and on the Town website.

The rate increase will be effective January 1, and will appear on the February 1 bill.

Firework Display for New Year's Eve

There will be a fireworks display, viewable from downtown, on December 31 at 10 pm. It was too dry on Fourth of July, so we'll enjoy the fire-



works as we welcome in the New Year.

Founders Day Lunch on February 9

Founders Day is New Castle's annual celebration of our 130-year-long history. Everyone is invited to the Community Center on Saturday, February 9, for lunch and a celebration of the early settlers who built New Castle. There will be more details in January newsletter.
