## Candidates for Town Council Announced

Town Clerk Melody Harrison has announced the candidates for three Town Council seats in advance of the April 7 Election. Incumbents Grady Hazelton, Crystal Mariscal and Graham Riddile are all seeking re-election. No other residents submitted election petitions.

When an election is uncontested, state law allows the ballot to be cancelled. On April 7 Hazelton, Mariscal and Riddile will be declared elected.

There was a narrow window of opportunity for a candidate to file an intention to run as a write-in. Such notices of intention should have been delivered to the Town Clerk by January 31.

**Correction:** Every once in a while an error escapes our notice and finds its way into this newsletter. In January we mistakenly wrote that Councilor Scott Owens was completing his term. In fact, Owens has two more years on the Council. It is Grady Hazelton whose term is expiring (along with Graham Riddile and Crystal Mariscal).

## Celebrate our History on Founders Day


Each year the Town celebrates its history in February, the month of New Castle's incorporation in 1888. This year Founders Day will be Saturday, February 8, from 11:30 to 1:30 in the Community Center.

The pot luck lunch traditionally features dishes that may have been familiar to New Castle's founding families and their successors in the post-coal mining period. All cooks are invited to contribute a dish to the lunch. Let Debbie Nichols know if you can help. She will be able to provide suggestions and recipes.

After lunch, Kathy Arthur will talk about the New Castle postmasters—a very relevant topic since Eat Bistro, which just opened a new addition, is in the long-time post office building. In addition, members of the Sample and Alexander families will share family stories.

There are several new additions to this year's festivities. The winner of the Snowman Contest will be announced, and Joe McNeil will revive his character from November's Spirit Walk, Claude Hall. At 2:00, following the luncheon, the New Castle Branch Library will present "New Castle: Then and

Now." Steve Rippy, former mayor and former town manager, will share some of his large collection of historic photographs. The event is part of the library's "Keeping History Alive" series. Whether New Castle old-timers or brand-new residents—everyone is welcome to celebrate our history.



## It Does Happen Here

On January 11, Garfield Emergency Communications reported the closure of I-70 between New Castle and Canyon Creek because of police activity. Soon after, they reported that there had been an officer involved shooting.

Police Chief Tony Pagni issued the following statement:

*Officers of the New Castle P.D. assisted GSPD in a vehicle pursuit of a suspect involved in an armed robbery call. The pursuit terminated in New Castle where an Officer Involved Shooting took place. The suspect was treated at the scene and unfortunately was pronounced deceased a short time afterwards.*

*The investigation of the actions has been turned*

*over to the Critical Incident Team involving members of Colorado Bureau of Investigation, Investigators of the 9th Judicial District Attorney's office and investigators for the Garfield County Sheriff's Dept. All officers involved have been given the option to take a leave of absence and have been afforded treatment for any repercussions from the incident. This situation will be updated after the conclusion of the investigation is completed.*

Stories of armed robberies, car chases and officer-involved shootings are staples of Front Range news media, but those are happening somewhere else. The events of January 11 remind us that our own police officers are always ready to place themselves in danger in the performance of their duties. It does happen here.



## Report from the Library

Last year voters approved additional funding for the Garfield County Library District. The District recently reported on their use of the additional funds:

- ◇ There are more books in the library. In particular they are purchasing more bestsellers in order to reduce wait times. The library welcomes suggestions for books to purchase.
- ◇ Hours will be expanded. The New Castle library is currently open 11 am to 6 pm on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays; 11 am to 7 pm on Wednesdays; 12 to 5 pm on Fridays; and 1 to 5 pm on Saturdays. As additional staff can be hired and trained, more hours will be added.
- ◇ The ebook and eAudiobook selections are being expanded, and soon RBdigital Comics will be available.
- ◇ This spring the libraries will add streaming movies and videos. Library cards will allow free access to both Knaopy and Hoopla, two of the most popular providers of streaming videos for libraries.
- ◇ Through thick and thin our libraries have remained community gathering places with lots of programs and events. This year events are planned around the themes of "Keeping History Alive" and "Working Communities."
- ◇ The additional funding for the library is allowing the replacement of older, outdated computers.

According to the 2020 Census web site at <https://2020census.gov>:

The Census count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. The 2020 Census counts the population in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). Each home will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by phone, or by mail.

The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data.

The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

It's also in the Constitution: Article 1, Section 2, mandates that the country conduct a count of its population once every 10 years. The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time that the country has counted its population since 1790.

Participating in the census is required by law, even if you recently completed another survey from the Census Bureau. A complete and accurate count is critical for you and your community, because the results of the 2020 Census will affect community funding, congressional representation, and more.
